### RULUF ANDRESS COLUMN by Elena J. Goodworth

## Carlo Andress

Carlo Andress was the fifth child and third son of Ruluf and Azubah Smith Andress. He was born 6 Nov 1804 in Essex Co., New York, according to a biography of his son George. He was a young lad of about 13 when he went to Ohio with his father's family. To quote (not verbatum) from the biography: "Carlo Andress commenced life as a pioneer farmer working early and late without any of the comforts and barely the necessities of life. For the wife of his earlier years he married one that was as willing to work as was he. " On 1 Mar 1832 he married Nancy Buckley, in Henrietta, Lorain, Ohio. "She was born in Auburn, N. Y. 30 May 1812. He was elected Justice of the Peace in 1842 and tried to have all troubles settled without any ill will. Nancy was a Christian woman, having joined the Disciple Church while quite young, and remaining true to her early faith till the last. She was noted for her goodness to the poor, and her kindness to the sick. Her sweet ness of disposition was spoken of often by all who knew her best. " Carlo and Nancy were the parents of two children.

(l) George Herbert was born 5 Aug 1834 in Henrietta. He became a prominent agriculturist. He attended Berea (Ohio) College two terms after completing the country schools. He helped his father clear the land of timber and undergrowth. At the age of twenty-three he commenced working his own farm. He finally owned 134 acres of prime land, one hundred of which was cultivated by his father. On 19 Jan 1860 he was married to Matilda Elson and they were the parents of Nancy Maude (13 Apr 1861), Earnest (18 July 1863- 8 Feb 1873, probably died of Typhoid Fever), and Leon C. (13 Mar 1865, who lost his life in the battle of San Juan Hill 1898). Less than three years later (10 Jan 1868) Matilda died.

George's second marriage was to Adelaide Ennis, 1 Feb 1871, and they were divorced, 19 Oct 1872. There was one son, Frank E., born 22 May 1872. He worked in the Express Office in Elyria, Ohio.

Pamela (Pamelia, Amelia, Permelia) Hutchinson became George's third wife 8 Nov 1872. To this union were born six children: (no name - possibly Walter; who died as an infant, born 16 Mar 1873, Edna Alice (16 Mar 1875), Elsie Maude (22 June 1876), Henry Martin (8 July 1880), Frederick Elmer ("Uncle Fred, " born 22 May 1887). George Herbert, died 4 Mar 1912 and Pamela in 1925.

(2) Nancy was 7 years of age at the time the 1850 Federal Census was taken. No other reference to her has ever been found.

Nancy Buckley Andress passed away 25 Aug 1851, aged 39 years, 2 months, and 25 days.

Carlo Andress then married Wealthy (Weltha) Smith 4 Dec 1851. "She was a model wife and mother, and devoted her entire time to her family. Carlo could at this time provide for his family far dif ferently than in his younger days. He and his wife were deeply interested in the wel fare of their children and the people of their household. They moved from Henrietta to Oberlin so that their children could be ed ucated at the college there. "Wealthy was born 16 Aug 1815, possibly in Pough keepsie, N.Y. (or was it Messina, St. Lawrence, N.Y.?) Two children were born to them.

(l) Alice Salome was born 30 Oct 1853, in Henrietta. She became the wiie of Robert Eugene Doolittle, 8 Jan 1873. They had three children. Charles Henry (7 May 1874, in Elyria, Ohio) who mar ried Ora Hence and was buried in Hills dale (or Painesdale?) Michigan; Harold (Harry) Madoris (27 Aug 1877) became a physician and practiced in Dallas, Texas; and Mary Edith (26 Nov 1878 25 Nov 1882). Robert E. Doolittle died 13 Jan 1921, in Dallas. Alice S. lived with her doctor son at 5643 Swiss Ave., Dallas. Her death occurred in 1943.

(2) Henry Martin, born 19 June 1855, in Henrietta, became a most prominent and successful business man in Elyria. Several biographies of him can be found in histories of Lorain County. He married, first, Medora Camelia Boyn ton, 9 July 1878, and they were later divorced. Three children were born to them: Maude (25 Aug 1881-14 Sep 1920) buried), Florence Jean (28 Dec 1888 in Elyria, living in California), and George Henry (28 Sep 1891). Henry's second wife was Ida M. Shank, who had three children by a previous marriage. She died 25 Nov 1934, at age 64. Then Henry married Mary E. (Mayme) Mc Bee, who died 26 Nov 1944. H. M. Andress "lost everything" in the 'de pression of 1929. His death occurred 24 May 1938, in Elyria.

Carlo's death record states that he passed away 1 Nov 1870, in Oberlin, Ohio, age age 64. Wealthy's death occurred a few months later, 26 Apr 1871, aged 55 years, 8 months, 10 days. They are buried with Nancy Buckley Andress in the "Andress Cemetery" in Henrietta, Lorain, Ohio near the intersection of state road #113 and Gore Orphanage Road.

### LIFE OF FRANCENA LUCY TUTTLE submitted by Diane B. Worwood

Francenia Lucy Tuttle was born 8 Oct 1845 at Westfield, Hampden County, Massachu setts, the daughter of Hubbard Bellows Tuttle (son of Henry Tuttle and Clarissa French) and Lucy Loomis (daughter of Squire Loomis and Patience Root). She was the eldest of three children. Her parents mi grated to Utah, and her sister, Lucina Clarissa, and her brother, Hubbard, were born at Spanish Fork, Utah County, Utah. FranceniaLucy spent her early years in Spanish Fork. She helped her mother in the hotel that her mother owned and operated in Spanish Fork. Very little is know of her life and what she did. She was baptized Oct. Oct. 8, 1853. She was about two months past her seventeenth birthday when she married Milo Andrus, at Salt Lake City, Utah, on Dec. 6, 1862. She was sealed to her husband and endowed the same day. She became the mother of three children: Byron Andrus, born Sept. 6, 1863, died Sept. 27, 1867; Oscar Andrus, born Aug. 1, 1866, died Sept. 3, 1925; and Ernest Amos Andrus, born Apr. 11, 1871, died Feb. 25, 1882. These children were born at Dry Creek (Draper) Salt Lake County, Utah. Her only child to attain adulthood was Oscar Andrus. He married Lucy Emaline Houghton, (daughter of Edgar and Martha Ann Packett Houghton). Her first son lived until he was four years old. The youngest son was killed when he was ten years old.

She died Nov. 6, 1872 at the age of twenty seven, at Salt Lake City, Salt Lake Co., Utah, and was buried in the Spanish Fork Cemetery. She had three children and at this writing, nine grandchildren, and 14 great-grandchild ren.

Hazel Aroha Andrus Chatwin Robbins, of Santaquin, Utah; Oscar Lynn Andrus,

deceased; Lucy Merle Andrus Gregerson Schettler, deceased; Eve Martha Andrus Carter, of Santa Ana, California; Ernest Andrus, deceased; Afton Edgar Andrus, deceased; June Andrus Balch Pockrandt, deceased; Keith Milo Andrus, of Canoga Park, California; and Max Curtis Andrus, of Covina, California.

# LIFE OF FRANCENIA LUCY TUTTLE (From Kate B. Carter, <u>Our Pioneer</u> <u>Heritage,</u> XIV, p 256)

Francena Lucy Tuttle, 11th wife of Milo Andrus, was born Oct. 8, 1845, in Westfield, Hampden, Massachusetts, the daughter of Lucy Loomis and Hubbard Bellows Tuttle. When Mr. Tuttle left for California in 1849, Francenia was the baby of the family, but during his absence a son, whom he never saw, was born to them. Her father died in California, Sept. 5, 1850. She accompanied her mother to Spanish Fork, Utah, and helped in the hotel which they built. She was married to Milo Andrus, her step-father, Dec. 6, 1862. Three children were born to this union: Byron, Oscar, and Ernest Amos. The only child to live to maturity was Oscar who was raised by his grand mother. Francenia died on Nov. 6, 1872 and is buried in Spanish Fork, Utah.

# LIFE SKETCH OF OSCAR ANDRUS

(by his daughter, Hazel Aroha Andrus Chatwin Robbins, with help from her two daughters, Mrs. Aroha Francena Chatwin Graham, and Mrs. Orsen T. --Vera Mae Chatwin-- Carter.)

Oscar Andrus was born 1 August 1866, at Dry Creek, now known as Draper, Salt Lake Co., Utah. He was the son of Milo Andrus and Francenia Lucy Tuttle Andrus.

I know very little about his life as a child, but his Mother died very young, and he was raised by his grandmother, Lucy Loomis Tuttle Andrus. His grandmother operated a Hotel in Spanish Fork, and his Mother helped in the Hotel. Father told us that he could remember that he stood on a box to wash dishes, as he was so small. I have been in this old building many times when I was young, as I went to the home of Uncle Alma Andrus and Aunt Serena to visit. I lived at Mammoth, Juab Co., Utah, and I would go down to Spanish Fork in the summer to stay awhile with my cousins. The Alma Andrus home was just north of the Hotel.

Oscar Andrus was baptized 3 Sept. 1874, at Spanish Fork, by William Jex. He was confirmed in Sept. 1874, by Thomas C. Martell. He was ordained a Seventy 13 Feb 1888 by Charles Monk, and ordained a High Priest 21 July 1918, by Apostle Stephen L. Richards. He received his Patriarchal Blessing 20 Jan 1885 from his father, Milo Andrus.

From what I have been told, he grew to young manhood in Spanish Fork, living in

the Lucy Loomis Tuttle Hotel, where the High School buildings now stand, on 3rd South and Main.

During these years he met a young lady who lived near by. This young lady was a daughter of Edgar Stratton Houghton and Martha Ann Paquet Houghton. Her name was Lucy Emeline Houghton. They were married 21 March 1889, in the Manti Temple, Manti, Utah, and endowed and sealed at the same time.

Grandfather Houghton bought a farm and home in Lake Shore and Oscar Andrus and his new bride lived at Lake Shore with my grandpa rents, for a few years.

It was from Lake Shore, Utah Co., that my father received his call to fill a mission in New Zealand. He departed for this mission 31 March 1890.

Mother lived with her parents while father was on this mission. It was at this place that I was born, 9 Nov. 1890.

My parents each owned several acres of land in Lake Shore and my father farmed this land. He returned from his mission 16 May 1893. It was a long mission, but father was pleased he had answered the call.

On the farm he had a garden and a farm. He raised grains and all the animals found on a farm. He had a fine team of horses (a pair of greys). They pulled the goddess float for many years on the 4th of July, at Spanish Fork Celebration. He hauled our coal from a mining town up in the mountains above Spanish Fork. This town was called Scofield. It was a long distance with just a wagon and horses for travel. We also had a large ice house to store chunks of ice from Utah Lake, to make ice cream in the summer, and other uses in the home. He sold the pork in Provo, all cleaned so white and wrapped in sheets or put in sacks. Father was very neat and clean. Everything had to be just right to please him.

My Mother took care of the Turkeys and chickens, did sewing for other people, and worked hard to help Father.

My parents were good Latter-day Saints and lived their religion to the best of their ability. They resided in Lake Shore until their 4th child was born in 1897.

My brother Oscar Lynn, was born 25 March March 1894, Sister Lucy Merle 7 Dec 1895, and my sister Eve Martha 20 Dec 1897.

A little later when Eve was only a few months old they decided to move to Mammoth, Juab Co., Utah. This was a mining town, in the Tintic District. Father worked in the mines and did any kind of work to pro vide a good home for his family. He walked to the Grand Central Mine which was a long way from our home, and he earned \$2.25 a day. They operated a small dairy which was hard work, but brought in a few dollars.

A native boy from New Zealand lived with

us until he grew to young manhood. He helped with the work that had to be done, and he and I delivered the milk when we were young. Father had a herd of cattle that grazed on the hills near our home. He also had a small garden, trees, lawn and flowers, also a fine team of horses and a buggy.

On 4 Jan 1900, my brother Ernest was born. Sometime later, Mother's health began to fail, and we had to move to Spanish Fork, because it was a lower cli mate. During our stay here another brother was born, 2 Nov 1902. His name was Afton Edgar. We soon moved back to Mammoth.

Our family was getting larger, so Father added on three more rooms and a bath. My sister June was born 26 June 1905; a brother, Keith Milo, 2 May 1909; and the youngest child, Max Curits, 17 Feb 1913. Father and Mother always had the thought in mind to educate their children. There were nine children, five boys and four girls. The three oldest were school teachers, one a graduate of Business College, one a graduate of University of Utah, and the others in other businesses or trades.

Father held many religious and civic positions wherever he lived. The onlyones I can recall were at Mammoth. He was Superintendent of Sunday School for many years, President of the M. I. A., Presi dent in the different quorums, and others that I never knew about.

He took part in many civic affairs, holding such positions as Chairman of School Board, County Commissioner and chairman of many celebrations and events that took place in Mammoth, Utah.

The life *in* Mammoth was a struggle, but we were all happy in spite of the hard ships. Our parents did everything to make a good home. It was our home, not a mansion, but a place where we never were cold, hungry or ill. We had plenty of sick ness at that time, but everything was done to help us get better.

Father's health was gone, and he became so ill that the family decided to send him to California. Mother sold the home in Mam mouth and drove to California to be with Father. My brother Keith, then only 15 years old was the driver. There were four of them: Mother, Sister June and youngest brother Max about 11 years old: It took courage to make that trip, but with Mother's determination and courageous brother, they arrived safely.

This was the year 1923 or 1924, and they lived at Santa Ana, California. About this time my brother, Lynn, and his wife, Etta, came from Salt Lake to be with Mother and the children. Father did not get any better. Family and friends did all they could for him. The many years he had worked in the mines had taken their toll, and he passed away 3 Sep 1925, at Santa Ana, Orange Co., California. His body was brought to Spanish Fork, Utah. Funeral services were held in the Second Ward Chapel, and he was buried in the Spanish Fork cemetery. I felt like he was one of the chosen, and he had given his life for his family and his religion.

LIFE SKETCH OF LUCY EMELINE HOUGHTON ANDRUS

(by her daughter, Hazel Aroha Andrus Chatwin Robbins, with help from her two daughters, Mrs. Aroha Francena Chatwin Graham and Mrs. Orsen T. --Vera Mae Chatwin--Carter)

My Mother was born 13 May 1869 at Spanish Fork, Utah Co., Utah, the daughter of Edgar Stratton Houghton and Martha *Ann* Paquet Houghton. She was blessed 23 June 1869.

I do not know if my grandparents lived at Spanish Fork or Lake Shore when she was a child, but I think it was at Spanish Fork. Grandfather was engaged in the sheep business. They traveled back and forth for many years between Utah and Cali fornia. Grandmother and my mother, then a young girl, traveled with them. Mother did not go to regular school, but a Tutor always went on the trips, and Mother re ceived a good education. She did go to regular schools later on.

She was baptized 22 Oct 1877. My grandparents lived in Spanish Fork, just south of the Lucy Loomis Tuttle Hotel. When grandfather Houghton acquired this home, I do not know, but Mother grew up here. Her Mother was ill for a number of years, and Mother kept the house and did the work with the help of her father.

Mother made many friends, and during this time she met Oscar Andrus. My Grandmother Houghton disapproved of Oscar Andrus as she did of every young man who was interested in her daughter, but later on after they had decided to get married she laughed and said, "Oscar Andrus was the only man she wanted for a son-in-law. " They were married 21 Mar 1889 in the Manti Temple, Manti, Utah. It seems from what I can remember that my Grandfather Houghton bought a farm and home at Lake Shore, Utah Co., and Oscar Andrus and his new bride lived for awhile with them.

It was from Lake Shore Ward that Oscar Andrus received his call to fill a mission in New Zealand. He departed for this mission 31 Mar 1890. Soon after, Mother went to Salt Lake to work. Being a won derful cook, she went into the homes of the wealthy and did the cooking for a few months. I was born 9 Nov 1890. After I was a little older, Mother went back to Salt Lake and worked again. She earned enough to buy all their furniture, so when Father came home they could have a home. It was a long mission, and he never returned until 6 May 1893.

My brother, Oscar Lynn, was born

25 Mar 1894; my sister, Lucy Merle, 7 Dec 1895; and my sister, Eve Martha, 20 Dec 1897.

My Mother was very ambitious, not only in the line of education from books, but hand work of all kinds. She told me she had dressed many a bride before she was 17 years of age. I can remember the beautiful clothes she made for other people, besides the lovely clothes she made for all of us. Wherever I would go my clothes were the envy of everyone, not for the cost, but the way they were made.

When we lived in Lake Shore, Mother would take us down to the Spanish Fork River and go in swimming, and farther up the river we would cross in a Flume and visit the Banks Family on the Palmyra side.

When my sister Eve was only a few months old, we moved to Mammoth, Juab Co., Utah.

Mammoth was a mining town, and father worked in the mines and helped build the mines and helped the Mammoth Mill.

This was a new adventure for all of us. We had a small new home in what they called Middle Town. Many people from the valley towns located there, such as Spanish Fork, Payson, Santaquin, and Goshen. Father's missionary companion George Hales of Spanish Fork, was the Bishop.

My parents were true to their religion, and they lived and taught their children the the principles of the Gospel.

At nights after the evening meal, Father would tell us about his early life, the life of the Pioneers and other, good stories, and and mother would be tending' the smallest child or knitting. She knit all our stockings, sweaters and scarfs. Her beautiful hands were never idle.

On the 4th of January, 1900, my brother Ernest was born. Sometime later, Mother's health began to fail, and we had to move to Spanish Fork, as it was a lower climate.

During our stay here, my brother Afton Edgar was born, 2 Nov 1902. Later on, we moved back to Mammoth. Our family was getting larger, so Father added on three more rooms and a bath. Another sister, June, was born 26 June 1905; a brother named Keith Milo, 2 May 1909, and the youngest child, my brother Max Curtis. 17 Feb 1913.

Mother spent most of her early married life with her family, as the children were young. But later on,, as they grew up she had more time to do the work she wished to do. She was head of the Red Cross work in the District, President of the Relief Society, teacher in M. I. A., and teacher in Sunday School, and many other positions that I do not know about. She always enjoyed teaching Sunday School, because when she was a young girl she would ride a horse to Spanish Fork to teach her Sunday School class, and to play the organ. Mother also taught school 1 year.

Taking care of the sick was another task that Mother did, besides taking care of her own family. If there was a sick baby or child in the neighborhood, they would go for Sister Andrus, as she had the faith and knowledge.

About this time in the early 20' s Father's health began to fail, and he could not do so much in Public Life. So he stayed home, and this gave Mother a chance to do more in our ward and the community.

As time passed, Father did not get any better, so the family decided to send him to California. He went to Santa Ana and lived at the home of Syrenus Gardner. Some time later Mother sold the home in Mammoth and went to California to be with Father. The three youngest children `went with her.

Father lived for about a year, then passed away 3 Sep 1925, at Santa Ana, Orange Co., California. He was buried at Spanish Fork, Utah, 8 Sep 1925.

Life had to go on, so the family stayed and made their home in California. Soon the three youngest married and had homes of their own, so Mother went to live with my oldest Brother, Lynn, at Long Beach.

Lynn and his wife, Etta, were very good to Mother all the years she lived with them. Mother and Etta did their Relief Society work and sewing for those that needed help, made quilts and rugs as her eyesight was still very good.

Almost every year she would come to Utah by bus or with someone to do her Temple work in the Salt Lake Temple, as the Los Angeles Temple wasn't built at that time. These trips were a task for her, and her health wasn't so good, and she became ill in January and passed away 27 Jan 1948, at Long Beach, Cali fornia. Her body was brought to Spanish Fork. Funeral services were held in the Third Ward Chapel, and she was buried in the Spanish Fork Cemetery. A won derful wife and Mother was laid to rest beside her husband, Oscar Andrus.
