uite frequently, when people learn my last name, I get asked if I am related to a certain Andrus. I then ask, "What kind of person or neighbor are they?" The reply is always, "Oh they are good people." I reply, "Oh, then I am probably related!"



I then get the chance to tell them that my great-grandfather

Milo Andrus had 57 children, so I have many cousins that I haven't met and don't even know, so I am undoubtedly related. My wife, **Audrey**, often experiences the same thing.

I am impressed when I read the history of Milo and find out what an impact and influence he had in church history. Included are his associations with the prophet, **Joseph Smith**, and as a member of Zion's Camp, along with many responsible church leadership positions he held. Milo served as a member of the First Quorum of Seventy, branch president, bishop, stake president, patriarch, temple ordinance worker and served as wagon master of several companies of saints moving west—and he helped them settle into their new homes in Utah and neighboring Idaho.

I have been pleased to hear from the pulpit in General Conference, at least two different times, apostles mentioning what a positive influence Milo and my **Uncle George** had on them or their ancestors.

I am proud of the heritage I have and to hear that our family is one of the largest families in the church and at the top of the list of families in the number of missionaries being sent out.

We can't choose our relatives but I am sure glad that I have such a good and solid foundation and a good family name. I am so grateful that I have been born of goodly parents with a good family name and great ancestors. I love to be able to tell the story of my grandfather, **Milo Jr.**, being born in the mission field in Great Britain as his father was serving his Heavenly Father as a

FROM THE EDITOR A CLOSER LOOK AT ROOTSTECH 2022—IT'S MUCH MORE THAN JUST 3 DAYS

oncerned you missed the chance to connect during the March 3–5 **RootsTech** this year? Don't be! The good news is, event organizers have extended the opt-in connection features through March 25, so there's still time.

Couldn't cram all that learning into a three-day window? More good news—the 2022 RootsTech materials will be available online to view on demand for at least the next year.

Those who have attended RootsTech before are huge fans of the event, but what is it really all about and why is it a big deal? Let's take a closer look.

What is RootsTech?

Launched in 2011, RootsTech is the world's largest family history conference, designed to help people "discover, gather and connect families past, present and future," according to RootsTech organizers. The event celebrates family and the discovery of family histories, and promotes connections to fellow conference goers by linking them through common ancestors.



Although the 2022 RootsTech conference is scheduled during the first week of March, online content, including keynote speakers and conference sessions, are available to view on demand through the next year. If you are interested in exploring and documenting your roots and connecting with people who may hold clues to the gaps in the different branches of your family tree, this event is for you. The 2021 conference drew 1.1 million participants from 242 countries.

What is the conference format?

The conference features four main elements: daily keynote sessions, 1,500 class sessions on 185 topics, a virtual exhibit hall featuring related businesses and resources, and **Relatives at RootsTech**—an online "experience" that shows how you are related to other RootsTech attendees.

The format is all-virtual, with online chat tools and a messaging feature to direct-message your relatives.

How do I discover and connect with relatives?

To find and connect with living relatives, start by visiting <u>www.familysearch.org/connect</u> to join Relatives at RootsTech. Next, register for RootsTech2022 at <u>www.rootstech.org</u>. Visit the Relative at RootsTech website (first web link) or use the **FamilySearch** Family Tree mobile app to see your relatives who have registered and how you are related.

To get the most of out of this feature, it is important to have your family tree in FamilySearch. At the time of this publication, 28,356 of my relatives have joined!

Who is the organizing sponsor?

The organizing host is **FamilySearch International**. FamilySearch is a nonprofit organization that offers access to genealogical records, education and the FamilySearch app available online and on your mobile phone. FamilySearch is operated by **The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints** and is closely connected with the church's Family History Department.

Do I have to be a church member to register?

The RootsTech conference and FamilySearch are provided free of charge to everyone, regardless of tradition, culture or religious affiliation.
