RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

OBJECTIVES

- Any birth record that may exist for Ruluf Andress (Andrus, Andrews) in unpublished records available only in the State of Connecticut

RESULTS

- No significant documents were revealed within the Probate Court records that have not been previously found by other researchers including church records, bonds, wills or deeds.
- New Haven Probate Court records show a document which the client already has. It is a guardian bond for "Joseph Johnson now chosen Guardian to Ruluf Andrus, a Minor of about 16 Years old of Hamden" which is dated 31 December 1789. This is consistent with the alleged year of birth of our subject, Ruluf. However there is no indication of the parents which is, of course, the goal. It may also be a clue to Ruluf's father. Why would a "neighbor" take responsibility of a minor? Paternity is one answer but there may be others. There are a number of Johnson's and at least 2 Andrus households in the 1790 census.
- A few other documents are available such as the last will and testament of Joseph Johnson with no mention of Ruluf and another stating "Personally appeared _____ Andrus a minor and made choice of Joseph Johnson of Hamden for his guardian and J s Johnson entered into a bond of £100." The first name of the Andrus referenced here is very likely to be Ruluf although not mentioned specifically. No other guardian bond for Joseph Johnson appears other than Ruluf.
- This brings an interesting development. No documentation of parentage has yet to be established for Ruluf Andrus, but the "Johnson" name opens a new avenue. "Families of Ancient New Haven" compiled by Donald Levi Jacobus indicates that "A Dutchman, Richard Johnson (also called "Derrick) settled in New Haven²³ March 1679 (NHV). He was not the only Dutch "Johnson." Also referenced is Walter Johnson (Wouter Jansen) son of Jan Wouters Van der Bosch & Arentje (Arents) of Flatbush. These Johnson families of New Haven may very well be a clue to the origin of the Dutchman Ruluf Andrus.

- Another clue to the closeness of these families turned up in a diligent search for the birth of Ruluf. On 29 December 1725, Joseph Johnson married Hannah Andrus. This couple is too old to have been the parents of Ruluf, but there's a reasonable possibility that there is more than this connection; perhaps they are uncle and aunt to Ruluf or even grandparents.
- Joseph and Hannah had a son named Joseph who, again, may hold answers to Ruluf's origins and may possibly be Ruluf's father.
- A Bastardy Bond would not necessarily be available unless the mother applied for financial assistance from the father through the court.
- Scans of the Probate Packet are attached. Also one of the pages of "Ancient Families of New Haven" linking the typically English name "Johnson" with Dutch immigrants who transliterated their "Jansen" names to "Johnson."
- The client states that Ruluf was born in Hamden, New Haven Co, Connecticut though Hamden was not incorporated until 1784, 11 after the stated year of birth.
- While at the Connecticut State Archives, a search was made in the vital records for Hamden in spite of the date discrepancy to be sure that nothing was missed. We consulted the vital records for towns that surrounds New Haven (the city) which itself was incorporated in 1638 that were once a part of New Haven: Branford (1685), Wallingford (1670) and Milford (1639). There were many "Andrews" families but none with a name even close to "Ruluf". We then looked at town established later than the 1773 year of birth: East Haven (1785), North Haven (1786) and Woodbridge (1784). Also, some Family Histories at www.familysearch.org suggest Hartford as a location of birth so that was checked as well. Again, no results
- Another piece of information uncovered that had not been mentioned in the record provided to this researcher was a legal notice describing the insolvency of a Ruluf Andrews in the "Republican" dated 13 July 1811 and published 16 August 1811 in Essex County, New York. Transcription of the notice: "By order of the Honorable Daniel Ross, Esq, first Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Essex: NOTICE is hereby given to all the creditors of Ruluf Andrews of said county, to show cause if they have any before said Judge , at Joseph Skinner's Hotel in Elizabethtown, in said county, on the twenty eighth day of September next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of that day, why an assignment of the said insolvents estate should not be made and he be discharged according to the statute in such case made and provided – Dated July 13, 1811 16

RECOMMENATIONS

- The probability of any records extant in the history of this family surfacing is very low. Several researchers have been involved over the years and every avenue has been taken to answer the client's question. It would seem that the thoroughness of the records at the Archives of the Connecticut State Library particularly the records of each town and village of late 18th century New Haven County, Connecticut and the exhaustive nature of the search that there is no birth record to answer the question.

RESEARCH STRATEGY

- As a follow-up to the exhaustive work of previous genealogical researchers, the singular source for unpublished records that may have held the requested birth records is the historical records of the New Haven District Probate Court. These records were accessed at the State Archives at the Connecticut State Library, 231 Capital Ave., Hartford, Connecticut.
- This researcher, with the aid and assistance of the Archive's staff, examined every possible microfilmed record and historical publication relative to the area and time frame of the subject family in search of any clues as to the parents of Ruluf Andress, using every imaginable spelling of the family name: Andress, Andres, Andrus, Andruss, Andrew and Andrews. Records were viewed that contained each of these permutations of the Andress family name but none was revealed to contain any birth information whatsoever for the subject.

RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

OBJECTIVES AS DETERMINED BY THE CLIENT

To determine the birth parents of Ruluf Andress born approx 1773 in Connecticut.

KNOWN INFORMATION

The client states the following:

According to his son Milo’s biography Ruluf was born 12 Mar 1773 in Hamden, New Haven County, CT.

That on 31 Dec 1789 he agreed to a Guardian Bond allowing Joseph Johnson of said county to be his guardian. (This information was verified by Dave Robison presented previously in this report)

Ruluf Andress marries an Azuba Smith (In some cases believed to be Azuba White) before 1796 in Vemont.

RESULTS

The research did not provide a solid answer to this problem.

There is a theory that Ruluf was born out of wedlock. This is unpopular with the Milo Andress descendants; but still plausible

There are however 3 potential women that could be the mother of Ruluf Andress.

1. Sybil Andress that passed away in September 1789, just 3 months before Ruluf's Guardian Bond.
2. Sybil, nee Hurlbut, Andress that was married to Joseph Andress. She passed away in 1785, he in 1786.
3. Sybil Andrus born approx 1755-1760, daughter of Gideon Andrus and Abigail Potter.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The first item to research would be that of the Guardian Bond. It is known that there were two men named Joseph Johnson's living in Hamden on the 1790 Census. One appears to be the son of the other as he is listed as Joseph Johnson Jr.

So the question now is plainly which Joseph Johnson signed the Guardian Bond for Ruluf Andrus? The elder or younger Joseph Johnson?

The younger Johnson was born approx 1767 – 1769. He marries a Sarah Dolittle on 3 Dec 1789 in Hamden, CT. It is interesting to note that the bond was signed shortly after the marriage.

Was Joseph Johnson Sr. the person spoken of in that Guardian Bond? If so, this suggests the theory that Sybil Andress is the mistress of Joseph Johnson Sr. This does appear to be a possible scenario.

The second item for further research will be the Probate record of the Sybil Andress that died in 1789. More information needs to be gleaned from that record.

The third and fourth items would be the less likely Sybil Andresses as shown above.

There is a fifth recommendation and that would be either to prove or disprove the following information as provided by Calvin Andrus and others. The most important part is provided below.

“THE HISTORY OF RULUF ANDRESS (ANDRUS) By Calvin N. Andrus, With important contributions by Laura Anderson and Levi Adam.

Ruluf Andrews/Andrus/Andress/Andres¹ was possibly born near Hamden, CT on 12 March 1773 to his father, Joseph Andrus, and his mother Sybil² Andrews (maiden name) Andress. He resided with his parents and older half-sister, Sarah, in the Cheshire, CT area during his infancy and childhood. Little is known of his childhood, though he was almost certainly not raised as a strict Congregationalist (Puritan). During Ruluf's youth, the highway between Hamden and Hartford was often traveled by distinguished Colonialists and Patriots en route between Boston and New York. At times the region was suppressed harshly by British Governors who sought to control the Colonialists and maintain a firm rule. Despite periods of great alarm during The Rebellion, the Colonies prevailed and the Connecticut prospered. Roads were much improved and commerce normalized. The Andrus family spread throughout the region and several branches of the family migrated up the Connecticut River to Hartford, CT and Vermont frontier A few years after the War of Independence, 1776-1779, Ruluf's father died, as is common in war with the spreading of disease. Sarah was married to John Toombs (Toms) 29 Oct 1767 in Poultney, Rutland, Vermont and moved with Ruluf and family residing in Essex County, New York. His mother, desiring him to learn a useful trade, and receive the discipline of her in-laws, had him placed under a Guardian Bond with Joseph Johnson. So, Ruluf would not run off before his apprentice was completed. Here, received some additional education in arithmetic and writing, though there is some evidence that his ability with English was limited but spelling was not a set thing until 1 The surname was probably derived from Andrew, originally, but was “Latinized” with the “ews”, “us”, “os”, “ess”, or “es” suffix as an affectation suggesting status and education. Ruluf preferred the “ess” suffix. Milo preferred the “us” suffix. The Andrews family that moved into the Hartford area was the most likely to use the “us” suffix originally. 2 In a private report to Cal Andrus in 2005, Levi Adam, a professional genealogist residing in Cal's home wrote, “Sibel (sp) also had no children recorded as being born or christened. Neither is there a marriage record ...it seems she came home to her parents, she knew she was ill. After her death, a Ruluf Andrus is placed by court approval into training (the December 31, 1789 Guardian Bond). This young Ruluf is also the exact age of our Ruluf Andrus. Ruluf comes from Dutch “Roelof”. I feel at very least (this given name) shows she (Sybil) was removed from her English-Congregational roots.” Laura Anderson, researcher for the Milo Andrus Sr has written about this Ruluf, she did not understand that this was the Ruluf we were looking for. The Johnson and the Andrews are related. Namely, Sybil's sister is married to Joseph Johnson, Ruluf's court-appointed guardian. Our conclusion is that not only is Ruluf our Ruluf, but the evidence is overwhelming. Sybil is also identified by the premier Andrus-Andrew genealogist, Donald Lines Jacobus, as daughter of Amos. This he did in his book, Families of Ancient New Haven. after his death. (Webster's Dictionary) Sybil, Ruluf's mother, probably dying of consumption, remained in the Cheshire area until her death in 15 August 1789 in Cheshire, Connecticut. At about age 19, Ruluf visited with his relatives near Rutland County, Vermont. His sister, Mrs. Sarah Toombs, was living in Poultney, Vermont. Ruluf may have been acquainted with Titus Andrus, who lived in Brandon, Rutland Co., VT at the time. Ruluf probably

farmed and worked on carpentry projects in the Poultney, VT area, a few miles south of Rutland. There, he met and married Azubah Smith, daughter of John and Sarah Smith, of Poultney, Rutland Co. VT. We have no record of the marriage, but it is believed to have occurred about 1795, in Pawlet, Vermont. There is no written record of how Ruluf and Azubah met and courted, though there is some chance they may have been introduced by Sarah, his sister. Ruluf and Azubah probably rented a farm initially. Sybil (23 Apr 1796), Oran (10 Apr 1798)³, and Almon, (10 April 1800), were born to them in the Poultney area, in Rutland Co., VT. As there are no surviving records from Rutland, the County seat, there is little information that has surfaced during this period.”¹

POTENTIAL NEW PROJECT COST

SCOPE OF THE WORK

The following compilation includes the families of the ancient town of New Haven, covering the present towns of New Haven, East Haven, North Haven, Hamden, Bethany, Woodbridge and West Haven. These families are brought down to the heads of families in the First Census (1790), and include the generation born about 1790 to 1800. Descendants in the male line who removed from this region are also given, if obtainable, to about 1800, unless they have been adequately set forth in published genealogies.

It is intended to give every record of birth or baptism to 1800, every record of marriage to 1810, and every record of death of individuals *born* prior to 1800 in the above towns. All dates derived from the public records are followed by an abbreviated reference in italics, indicating their source. A key to these abbreviations is provided. The vital records of six towns, the registers of seven churches, and the inscriptions in twenty-seven graveyards have been copied. The probate, land and court records have been searched, as far as they relate to families that settled in this region prior to 1750. Much material has also been gathered from probate and town records of districts and towns outside of this region. Dates not followed by symbols are usually from printed authorities which, although unverified, are considered trustworthy.

The early Wallingford and Cheshire families, which for the most part were of New Haven origin, are given completely to 1780, and in many instances to 1800.
